International business opportunities discussed

The International Visitors Council of Los Angeles held its Second Annual International Affairs luncheon recently to discuss current international issues affecting Los Angeles.

Chairing this organization, which looks into researching problems that deal with international trade, is Jerry Silva, the region manager of public affairs for Southern California Edison.

Issues of concern to the members (also known as citi-

zen diplomats) dealt with environmental issues, conflict resolution, and democracy.

Ed Royce, a U.S. congressman representing the 40th district, spoke about international issues ranging from public diplomacy to national security.

"I currently serve on the International Relations Committee," said Royce. "Southern California leads the nation and the world. We are ambassadors to Asia and other parts of the world. We are able to take

advantage of the growth and we need to expand the infrastructure. Imports and exports had a growth of 14 percent this past year, and we expect the same for next year.

"Do we need to consider alternate routes outside of Long Beach to facilitate the expansion and growth coming from Asia and other parts of the world? We need to increase investment and productivity, and we need to seize the opportunities."
